Our local N.A.A.C.P. Branch wishes to award one annual scholarship to continue to support our mission to "ensure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of ALL persons and to eliminate race-based discrimination."

Eligibility:

- A student must be a graduating senior in good standing from a school district located in the Glens Falls NAACP Branch region.
- A student must identify as belonging to one or more of the following ethnic or other identifying groups:
 - African American (having origins in any of the Black peoples of Africa)
 - Hispanic or Latino (Puerto Rican, Mexican, or Central/South American, regardless of race)
 - Native American (having origins in any of the indigenous peoples of North America, and maintaining cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition)
 - Asian or Pacific Islander (having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific islands)
- A student must be planning to attend a 2 or 4 year college, university or other institute of higher learning, or technical or trade school.
